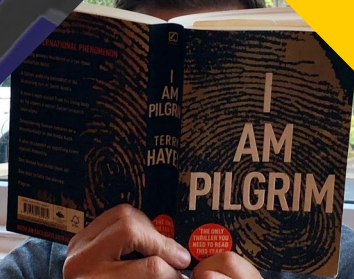

As well as this, Hannah's work has also been met with accolades from The Bath Children's Novel Award (2019) and the Hachette Children's Novel Award (2020).

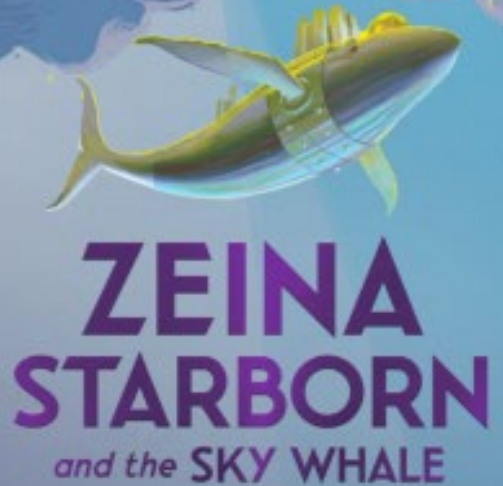

Veronica Roth wrote her debut novel, *Divergent*, while on winter break from her studies at Northwestern. She sold the book before graduation, and film rights sold before the book's release.

Bishop of Durham Reading Award

The Bishop of Durham Award is exclusive to pupils at Ian Ramsey CE Academy.

This award is named after the Bishop of Durham, The Right Reverend Paul Butler. He has always believed that reading is a hugely important skill for everyone. He said, '*I love reading and encourage others to do so*'.

There are three main levels to the award: Bronze, Silver and Gold. Each level has a series of reading tasks to complete with badges and certificates awarded along the way.

Each task must be signed off by a teacher or adult. Once a level has been completed, you can start the next level.

Awards will be given at the end of each year.

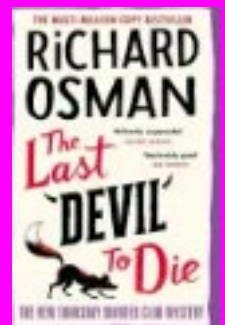

The Last Devil to Die by Richard Osman

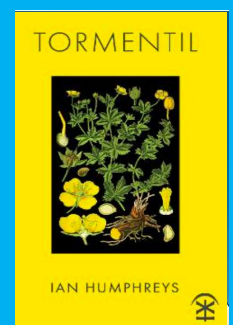

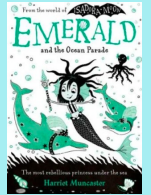
Five Survive by Holly Jackson

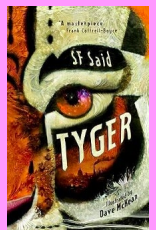
Girl, Goddess, Queen by Bea Fitzgerald

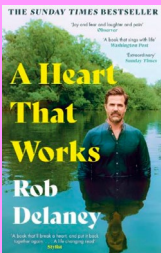

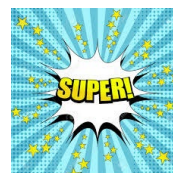
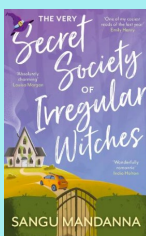
Bournville by Jonathan Coe

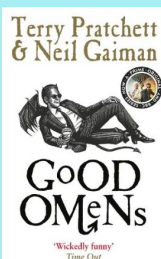
The Very Secret Society of Irregular Witches by Sangu Mandanna

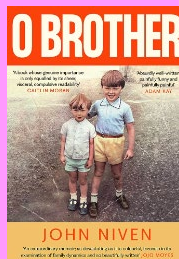
Good Omens by Terry Pratchett and Neil Gaiman

Word of the Month

Assay

(Origin: Old French)

Assay is a technical word meaning 'to test something (such as a metal or drug) to find out what it contains or to assess its value.'

Sometimes, this word is confused with 'essay'. They come from the same root, the Middle French word *essai*, meaning 'test' or 'effort.' (*Essai*, in turn, comes from the Late Latin word *exagium*, meaning 'act of weighing'). At one time, the two terms were synonyms, sharing the meaning 'try' or 'attempt,' but they are now typically differentiated, with *essay* meaning 'to try or attempt' (as in 'a comedic actor essaying her first dramatic role') and *assay* meaning 'to test or evaluate' (as in 'blood assayed to detect the presence of the antibody').

Reading is a huge part of our academy. Throughout our school, we have implemented a number of reading strategies that will give pupils access to a wide range of literature both inside and outside the classroom.

Our *Reading for Pleasure* lessons have been met with fantastic positivity and enthusiasm from our KS3 pupils. Texts have been specifically chosen that link not only to our curriculum, but to our Christian values as well. This year, pupils will enjoy a range of texts such as:

Then by Morris Gleitzman

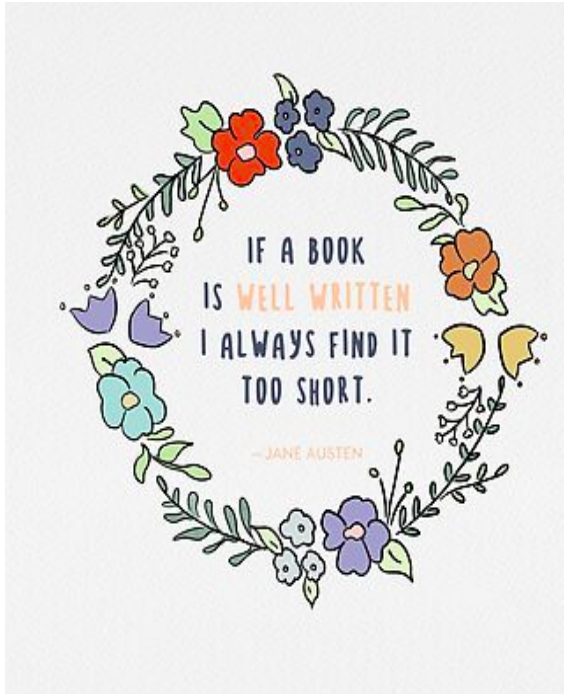
Year 9
